TENN. SHIRLEYS

THOMAS SHIRLEY b. 1760/61 S.C.

He was a resident of Fairfield Co.,
S.C. in 1780 when he entered the
service as a volunteer. His father
died before he was born.

Thomas said since the Revolutionary War he had lived in Davidson Co., then McNairy Co., Tenn. From there to Clinton Co., Fayette Co., and Jackson Co., Ill. In 1850 he was a resident of Washington Co., Mo.

(Info. from pension papers when he transferred from Jackson Co., Ill. to Wash. Co., Mo.)

Editor's notes on research of this material:

Richard b. 1712 Va. line seems to be the main residents of Fairfield Co., S.C. early. Only 3 sons known:

Robert b. 1736 m. Jane - 2 sons known

John b. 1738 m. Rebecca - 4 sons known

Thomas - no info.

Thomas states in his pension papers his reason for moving from Illinois to Missouri:

He has some children in Missouri and he and his son (<u>Jordon</u>) with whom he lives desire to re-move to Miss.

In 1840 Washington Co., Mo - Jonathon Shirley.

In 1850 Pike Co., Ark - Jonathon Shirley. I think we can assume Thomas sons are Jordan b. 1804 Tenn. and Jonathon b. 1807 Tenn.

I suspect William D., b. 1800 Tenn. living in Montgomery Co., Ill (next to Fayette Co., Ill.) could be a son as dates and location are right. Also Wm., b. 1823 Tenn., lived Madison Co., Ill. 1850 who is probably related.

Another person living in Davidson Co., Tenn. in 1830 Census is Paul Shirley, son of Old Thomas of Adair Co., Ky. (See p. 6, July '79 News.)

In April 1980 "News", page 5, see article on Crawford/Dent Co., Mo.

These Shirleys state they are from Warren Co., Tenn. In 1850 Cole Co., Missouri Census is Isasc, b. 1787 S.C. When this group settled here they stated they were from Green Co., Tenn. Looking at 1830 Census, Green Co., Tenn we find:

In Carter Co., Ky. 1855 - Wm.
Noland made oath he served in Rev.
War. (He was 98 years old.) He
volunteered in 1781 under Captain
Charles Lewis of the Light Horse
Troops as a private in Fairfield Co.,
S.C. and served six months during
which time he had a skirmish at the
Cross Roads near Kings Mountain and
shot the horse of a British officer
who was in pursuit of Captain Lewis.

Later he fought under General Wayne and General Green at the battle of Eutaw Springs in South Carolina. While living in S.C. he knew James Young, Andrew Martin, James Martin, Thomas Nesbitt, Moses Cockrell, George Noland, Col. Jerry Cockrill, Luke Bishop, all living in Fairfield Co., S.C. & that he knew Joseph Trotter, Jack Cannon, Jesse Ginn, General Walden, Champ Shirley, James Shirley, all of whom were in the service.

William Shirley, son of Daniel b. 1792 PA and Anna Flynn, was one of the first settlers of Lancaster Co., Neb. He built an inn and it was called Shirley's Station. The facilities served as an over-night stopping place for early stagecoaches, and sat on the east bank of Stevens Creek about 3 miles east of University Place.

William Shirley came to Neb. in 1857 and picked his claim on Stevens Creek. He went back to Bethlehem, Iowa--where he wintered and then came back in the spring of 1858 to Nebraska to settle. He found someone already camped on his claim but he was successful in trading his team of horses for the claim and a yoke of oxen. He busied himself at once at building a temporary log shelter for his family. This was replaced by a house. This house was the first built in Lancaster Co. and was, for a number of years, a notable landmark.

John S. Gregory, who use to operate the salt factory at the salt basin--now Capitol Beach, writes of his trip West in 1862. "From Weeping Water to the salt basin I followed an Indian trail over the divide, then an absolutely unsettled waste of rolling prairie—not a settler except at Stevens Creek, where William Shirley had a ranch and log cabin of two rooms. Here the stage coach "put up" for the night, and here also many pioneer families, westward bound, found a night's lodging with this friendly settler and his family. Some of these early travelers will recall a wooden sign bearing the words "Travelers Rest" which hung in front of the inn. This sign was a gift of a wayfarer who had reached the inn in a snowstorm and in an almost frozen condition. He was walking toward the last "back to civilization" after an unsuccessful venture in the west. He was without money, but the Shirleys would not let him go on. As he thawed out before the hospitable fireplace, he determined to send something later in payment for their kindness.

A few months later a traveler from the East brought in the sign, sent by the man whom they had befriended. For years it flapped on leather hinges before the inn.

One pioneer of this part of Nebraska tells of having seen as many as one hundred covered wagons at one time camped about the place waiting for the floodwaters of Stevens Creek to go down and for the banks to dry enough so the teams could ford the stream at that place.

William Shirley's son Charley W. Shirley was the first white child born in Lancaster Co., Neb. He was born in October of 1858. Some histories of the area give the name of F. Morton Donohue as first born, and gives his birthdate as March 1859. William' Bible, still in existence, has the date 1858, indeed giving this honor to Charley W. Shirley.

BEDFORD/HUNTINGTON CO., PA

Bedford Co., Pa. formed in 1771 from Cumberland Co. In 1787 Huntington Co. was formed from Bedford Co. and in 1846 Blair Co. formed from Huntington and Blair Co.

Settlers in this area before the Revolutionary War included William and John Shirley. In 1788, five years after the close of the first war with Great Britain, John and William were still residents there. Also residents were the Norris family from Hagerstown, Md. and the Keith family whose children married into the Shirley family. Shirleys in the 1790, 1800, 1810, 1820 Census and early land grants from this area are:

I recently heard from a descendant of Richard's line. The story of the origin of their Shirleys, as told thru the years in their family, is that Richard came from a plantation in Virginia.

The interesting puzzle to this group of Bedford/Huntington Co., Pa Shirleys is they live so close to Walters line in Frederick Co., Va. and also to the Daniel b. 1792 Pa., Peter b. 1794 Pa., and John b. 1778 Pa, all having lived in Morgan Co., Va. by 1850 Census. (See article in this issue on Daniel, Peter and John).

John b. 1728 is the father of George b. 1761 Pa. (and my husband's ancestors). Their descendants lived in Morgan Co. and Washington Co., and Athens Co., Ohio, Winnebago Co. and Boone Co., III., La Porte Co., Ind., Black Hawk Co., Iowa, Logan Co., and Carroll Co., Ark.

Shirleysburg, Huntington Co., Pa is one of the original townships and in all probability the pioneer in point of settlement in Huntington County, and received its name thru an act of courtesy on the part of Governor Morris to one of his trusted and faithful Generals, Shirley... (later, Governor of Mass. One of a line of stockades or forts built in 1755 and reaching out across the then forests westward from Susquehanna; one was located in this township just outside the north end of the limits of Shirleysburg and named by Governor Morris "Fort Shirley" in January 1756. From this the township was named, also the borough of Shirleysburg.

Valentine Shirley's grand-daughter (her father was Henry b. March 26, 1779) Susan was born in 1828. She married Enos Halbert in 1848, Orange Co., Indiana.

The following was written by their daughter Emma Halbert Briggs (see April '80 "News", page 10.)

"Enos Halbert was 23 and Susan Shirley 20 when they were married, tho they had known each other for some time when Enos said to Valentine Shirley, 'I want that blackeyed, curly-haired daughter of yours.' After they were married they went to housekeeping on a new piece of land Valentine had given Susan. The land adjoined the Halbert homestead on the river in Orange Co., Indiana. The post office was Orangeville.

"Enos built a good-sized log cabin. With the dowry Susan's father and mother gave her, they were able to go to housekeeping--a cow, sheep, pigs, chickens, and all their household goods, such as feather beds, home-made linen and coverlids previously prepared with Susan's mother's help. The towels and sheets were also hand-woven. When they got settled, Susan got a loom. With sheep wool she wove shirts and dress goods at home on boughten cotten warp, for she was a good weaver and she knew how to meet the demands of the household.

"About 2 or 3 years after they were married, news flashed about gold in California. Enos, his father and two brothers went to California--leaving their wives to carry-on in Indiana. They took the horses, wagons and a pair of oxen each, leaving very little behind. Susan tended the stock she had left, plow and sow, raised all the crops she could and raised her baby girl.

"Four weary years went by. From the stock she had left, she had a steady increase. The hens gave eggs to sell. Then there was the wool she sheared from the sheep, for sale. From her corn she had meal. The apple trees they set out at first on their farm began to bear; she dried apples for sale. Sometimes she could sell homemade yarns to some family that did not spin. Sometimes her mother and father came for a few day's visit.

"The gold seekers came home with but little money and picked up the broken threads where they left off. The women had kept the home fires burning though weary of doing the outdoor and indoor work. The depleted stock had increased in the 3 years they were gone. They were better off than they expected!

This family is living in Campbell Co., Ga. in 1850. In 1830 Riley is in Habersham Co., Ga., most likely a descendant of Richard b. 1712 Va. line. I suspect Moses Shirley, b. ca. 1760/1770 living in Habersham Co. in 1830 to be Riley's father.

OLIVER CHESTER SHIRLEY, b. 1897 in Texas (grandson of David A. and Frances Shirley) lost their farm in Texas during the depression. Oliver and his wife loaded the kids in the car and headed for California. Family tradition has it that before the Civil War, the family had owned property in Georgia and Arkansas.

(Descendants! Now you know they were in Georgia and that they came from South Carolina before that and were originally from Virginia.)
