



JOSEPH SHIRLEY (son of William Washington Shirley)

JOHN PINKNEY SHIRLEY was born May 19, 1827 in Alabama. His ancestors came from England to Virginia to South Carolina to Alabama. His parents were born in S.C. He moved to Mississippi in about 1842 where he owned a plantation.

He befriended the Mormon missionaries, protecting them from the mobs on several occasions, but he never joined the church.

According to Charles A. Shirley, a grandson, and Joy Ham Montgomery, a great, grandaughter, John Pinkney had two brothers. One was William Washington who was married to Mary Bucklew and James B. In 1860 Lauderdale Co. Miss. census, J.B. was living in the household with John Pinkney and William Washington was living next door.

All three brothers served in the Confederate Army. J.B. Shirley was captured when Vicksburg fell.



My maternal grandparents were William Randolf Shurley, born of staunch southern parents. Not sure where he was born, but know he was of English descent. Lived in Athens from your namhood till he died at age 66. He was Marshall of Athens for 30 years and is buried there.

My grandmother, Adeline Moore Shurley, was a very refined aristocratic lady. Traced her ancestors back through the Moores, Evans, Longworths. She was of Northern parents and during the Civil War was placed in a very uncomfortable position. Her father and two brothers fought on the Union side and husband and sons for the Confederate side. When things got too bad during battle, a Confederate guard was sent to their home to protect them from the Yankees. They had two sons and three daughters.

My mother, Mary Jane Shurley, was the youngest child. She was raised very strictly and taught many things as a child.

My grandfather freed 30 slaves at surrender. My mother had her own waiting maid. She went to private school and then to Lucy Cobb Institue, a private female college. She married quite young and was left a widow with two children. She continued her studies and became a doctor's techician. Worked for a Dr. Lallestedt (who's mother kept and helped to raise her two small children). They worked in several towns in Georgia including Augusta and Milledgeville. Came to DeKalb Co. where he established a practice. She married Francis Marion Dobbs in about 1870. She continued her work with Dr. Lallestedt. Was very active in church and community. Wrote many articles for publication. She died at age 60 of cancer.

By 1850 census she is 70 and state of birth is S.C. She may have been the wife of Aaron Swafford who appeared in 1800 census of Greenville Co. S.C. Her children are as follows:

OLDEST NATIVE TENNESSEEAN BLACKMAN SHIRLEY

from: Chattanooga Times, Sunday, April 1 1928.

"Aged 108, said to be the oldest native Tennessean, now a resident of Parker Co. Texas,

"Mr. Peace who, himself, is now a grandfather, when a boy knew Mr. Shirley and recalls that Mr. Shirley was then a thrifty Hamilton Co. farmer, aged in the late forties or early fifties."

"Since returning to Chattanooga from his visit in Texas, Mr. Peace has gone to the courthouse and studied the records to ascertain dates of deeds to aid in fixing Mr. Shirley's exact age. Among other records, he found one which was most interesting to him, the transfer of a farm to his father, J.W. Peace, Methodist circuit rider in January, 1870."

"I reckon I'm here to stay" says Blackman Shirley, aged 108, one of the oldest native Tennesseans and now a resident of Parker Co. Texas."

"Everyone I knew long ago is dead and gone But it seems that I just can't get away from here." and the old man, now a centenarian checkled mildly over his words in summing up a conversation about his age and old times in his native state Tenn.

"Blackman Shirley was born in Sequatchie Valley, Tenn. near Jasper about 1820. He is now attracting wide attention as being one of the oldest men in the country. He has been made a guest of honor at Parker Co. fairs and other occasions in his resident county in Texas and the Weatherford Texas Chamber of Commerce has entertained him. He is held in high esteem in his community."

"Mr. Shirley spent the first sixty-two years of his life in East Tenn.mostly Hamilton Co.; he was a thrifty farmer being a large wheat and corn producer and also dealt in cattle and land."

"During the Civil War Blackman Shirley served in Co. F, Fifth Infantry of Tenn. He received an honorable discharge and is now enjoying a liberal pension."

"Mr. Shirley is enjoying good health, Mr. Peace says, and enjoys eating as well as ever. His sight is not good but his hearing is excellent. He is in comfortable circumstances, and is now living with his third wife who is a very___woman and a comfort

to him in his old days. They have a daughter born to them in his ninetieth year. She is now married to.....

"Five daughters and one son by his former marriages are also living, some of them having their homes near him. He has one girl 80 years old.

"Mr. Shirley told Mr. Peace that he often thinks of Tenn. and wishes he could see it again. Tears come to his eyes when speaking of bygone days in his native state. He recalled that he was a grown young man when James K. Polk of Tenn. was elected president of the United States. He remembers when the "stars fell in 1833", and when the first steam railroad was built in America. He saw John A. Murrell, that notorious outlaw of Sequatchie Valley, in the early days of Tenn."

"Many of the older reseidents of Hamilton and Marion counties will recall Old Man Black Shirley," states Mr. Peace.

"My first recollection of Mr. Shirley was in 1867, when he moved my father, J.W. Peace, who was at that time a Methodist circuit rider, then being transferred from Pikeville circuit to another circuit. I remember Mr. Shirley had a pair of mules Elizabethtown, Ky. in Hardin County in and an old fashioned covered wagon. In that old covered wagon was placed our household goods; in fact everything in the world that we had. I remember that I and my brother walked the mountain as we traveled into Hamiton Co. I recall, too, how Old Man Black Shirley locked the wheels of his heavy wagon with chains, as was done in those days."

"In 1869, my father located and bought a farm from Mr. Shirley adjoining Mr. Shirley's farm. We were neighbors for serveral years."

"Mr. Shirley was a jolly, good natured man and loved to tell a good joke and was always the center of attraction in a crowd. About 1881 he migrated to Parker Co. Texas where he has lived ever since.

There is some controversy over his age. He doesn't know his exact age but he reckons his age by certain events which make him think he is about 108 years old. I have known him since 1867. Then he had the appearance of a man in his late forties.

Dear Betty;

When I saw the surname Sherley, I just had to ask this question---odd as it may seem.

My father was named Sherley William Spencer and was born a few miles outside of Elizabethtown, Kentucky, in a log cabin Dec. 28, 1891 and died 1983.

There are no Sherley's in our family ancestory that we have ever heard of, but dad once told my daughter that the unmarried schoolteacher in the country school next door to the cabin told his parents that she would buy shoes for the 3 older kids if they would let her name the baby when it came. She named him Sherley William and bought the shoes.

I am wondering if the schoolteacher was a Sherley or, I suppose she could have "loved a sweetheart named Sherley, perhaps even William Sherley.

The question in my mind is: does anyone in the Shirley Association know of any kind lady schoolteacher named Sherley near Dec. 1891? Can anyone shed any light on this?

Interesting Facts About SHIRLEY PLANTATION AND the CARTER & SHIRLEYS.

[from: Shirley's in Maryland and Virginia 1600's and 1700's by Betty Shirley].

The Shirley Plantation was established in 1613 by Lord Delaware West, son-in-law of Sir Thomas Sherley, the elder of Wiston in Sussex, England.

Colonel Edward Hill came into possession of the Shirley Plantation in 1660 and it remained in the Hill family until the third Edward Hill gave it to his daughter, Elizabeth, when she married John Carter, son of King Carter, and Shirley has remained in the Carter family since 1723.

Edward Hill I was granted 450 acres in Charles City County, Virginia for personal adventure and transportation of 8 people. He was commissioned in 1645 by Governor Berkeley to travel to Maryland and demand the return of certain Virginians who had taken up land illegally.

Apparently, Hill and Governor Calvert of Maryland had an agreement to protect Lord Baltimore's interest in the colony while the Governor hurried to Virginia on business. Hill was to be compensated for his services and Gov. Calvert signed a commission to Capt. Hill "deputing and appointing him Gov. of the Province of Maryland" in his absence.

Hill was not immediately compensated after his return to Virginia. He waited for his money which was slow in coming. Suddenly, Gov. Calvert died and the executor of his estate, Margaret Brent, settled the debt promptly.

In 1647, Edward Hill lived at Westover and by 1655, a deed for 60 acres of land in Charles City County refers to him as Edward Hill of Shirley Hundred. In 1660, Colonel Edward Hill patented 416 acres within the boundaries of Shirley Hundred, including the site on which the present mansion now stands.

Edward Hill II inherited the Shirley Plantation when his father died in 1663. Lord Culpeper stated he knew Edward Hill since his youth. Edward Hill II married Tabitha Custis, widow of General John Custis of Arlington, Virginia.

Edward Hill III inherited the Shirley Plantation when his father died in 1700. He married Elizabeth Williams. He had a cricket court on his lawn at Shirley where Governor Spotswood played cricket as well as other notables of the day.

Edward Hill III was the father of Elizabeth Hill who married John Carter, son of King Carter. Edward Hill gave Shirley Plantation to Elizabeth as a wedding present.

*Charles Carter, son of Eliz. Hill and John Carter, was the father of 23 children. One of these children was Ann Carter born in 1773. She married Lightfoot Harry Lee.

Lee was a widower with several children. He was twice Ann Carter's age and her father was not much in favor of this romance.

Thomas Jefferson had offered an ambassadorship to Lee to France but Lee declined the appointment and this apparently smoothed the was to the marriage as the wedding took place at "Shirley".

Their fourth son was ROBERT E. LEE who was born January 19, 1807. He later became the famous General Robert E. Lee.

The father of King Carter was John Carter who with his brother, Thomas Carter, emigrated to America about 1649 and settled in upper Norfolk County Virginia. (Thomas Carter married Katherine Dale, daughter of Edward Dale).

John Carter married 5 times, the fifth being to <u>Elizabeth Shirley</u>, a spinster of Gloucester Co. Virginia.

John Carter's fourth wife was the mother of King Carter. Thus, Elizabeth Shirley was the step mother of King Carter who's son married Eliz. Hill and they inherited Shirley Plantation!

Margaret Brent and her brother, Giles Brent came from England to Maryland in 1638. By 1651, they migrated to what is now known as Northumberland Co. Va. They had become weary of the bickerings of the Puritans of Maryland. They brought into Northumberland Co. many Marylanders upon whose headrights a great amount of land was granted, being more than 15,000 acres.

In Westmoreland Co. Va. 1660, Giles Brent signs as witness with Robert Sherley.

*Charles Carter married Anne Butler Moore, daughter of Ann Catherine Spotswood and Colonel Bernard Moore. (Ann was the daughter of Governor Spotswood of Virginia).

JOHN SHIRLEY born Decemebr 10, 1797. He was the son of James Shirley born ca. 1759 (See Shirley NEWS Jan. '3 page 2) and the grandson of James who came to America ca. 1730 from Ireland settling in Chester, New Hampshire.

John Shirley married Margaret Houston of Bedford. She was the daughter of Robert and Ann (Barr) Houston. John and Margaret resided in Bedford, Canada and Niagara Falls. For a time he kept tavern at the Dana or Abram Richards place on Wallace Road. He died Oct. 20, 1886.

In mid- March, we mailed 2000 letters to Shirleys in Australia, New Zealand, Jamaica, Barbados, South Africa, Canada Ireland, Scotland, Wales and England, announcing the initiation of SHIRLEY ASSOCIATION INTERNATIONAL! We are slowly getting members and response. Some of the material about their Shirley ancestors is very interesting!

If you haven't joined the International Association, may I encourage you to do so? There is a much broader coverage of Shirleys from everywhere and they are equally as interesting as the American Shirleys of the past.

If you are wondering why I would branch out to an International Association, it because I see the Shirley picture on a larger scale than perhaps the person who is just struggling to learn about who his or her great grandparents were. For you, you may not be able to comprehend the larger picture yet. We understand this. I didn't either when I started in the Shirley work. It grows on and you become more knowlegable as time goes by.

It is my opinion that there are many Shirleys in the other countries just as interested to learn more about their ancestors as we are to learn of ours. As we concentrate on our own here in the states, there are those here in the states who want to connect to their England or Ireland Shirley ancestors. They have already learned beyond the great grandparents and their and my level of personal interest is now to connect with the ancestors of abroad.

By studying these other Shirleys and members sending their family data and stories to us from all over the world, (most take us right back to England about late 1700's and early 1800's), they may have family data on their ancestor's brother or...who left for America in early 1600 or 1700's. In other words, we need to work from both sides of the world to gain our information. To make a long and very interesting story short, the house and one acre of land has been offered to the Shirley Association as a gift and as a tax right off for the new buyer. We are now waiting for a letter to give to our attorney and looking into the possiblities of tax exempt status etc...

If this becomes a reality and we are able to complete this transaction, there will be expenses for work to be done in necessary areas such as new roof and a few windows and etc... We are hopeful that others who descend from Obediah or related to the family, such as Benjamin and Eliz. Hughes Shirley line may take interest in helping with donations and etc. if and when this becomes a reality.

I have asked Shirley Faye Hill to head this project. If you have any suggestions, wish to offer assistance in donations or labor to work on the house in the future, please contact Shirley.

It is possible that we may have a work week next summer to work on the house to repair damages etc. It reminds me of the old days when they gathered together from all over to help build a barn or house.
